McPherson County Real Estate Owners

January 1st is the assessment date for all Real Estate. Please report any NEW buildings, ADDITIONS to current buildings, including ANY CEMENT FLOORS added to buildings, or the REMOVAL OF ANY STRUCTURES on your real estate during the 2018 year, to the McPherson County Clerk.

An Improvement Information Statement MUST be filed with the McPherson County Clerk for ALL new structures or improvements to existing structures PRIOR to the beginning of the project. This may be done at the time of obtaining a building permit, for those residential structures requiring a Building Permit.

Landowners will also need to report any land use changes which were made after January 1, 2018. This would include grassland converted to dryland or irrigated, or the conversion of any cropland back to grass.

This information is vital in helping maintain updated real estate records.

NPPD Chooses to Ignorethe truth

NPPD has recently released an eight page insert included in many Nebraska newspapers regarding the NPPD R-Project. They seem to be intent on restoring their tarnished public image. This insert contains many statements that are misleading or not factual.

The R-Project will tear through the heart of the Nebraska Sandhills. The Sandhills are a unique and environmentally sensitive area that supports a vast array of wildlife including a number of endangered species. They are unique only to Nebraska and most would agree they are our states most magnificent natural resource. Size does matter! NPPD belongs to the Southwest Power Pool (SPP), a fourteen state consortium that oversees electrical transmission. SPP planning documents from 2012 reveal that the R-Project "...has been chiefly proposed to provide access for wind (energy) development in Cherry County..." The cumulative impact of wind energy development in the Sandhills will be devastating both to the fragile environment and to the wildlife. Of great concern is the impact to the Whooping Crane. NPPD's data set, created by their Idaho consultants who focus on promoting these types of projects and paid by NPPD, supports the idea of minuscule risks to Whooping Cranes. However, other experts using more recent telemetry data have shown significant risk to this critically endangered species while

engaged in daily low level foraging flights. Indeed, power line impacts are the main cause of Whooping Crane mortality. NPPD chooses to ignore this better science.

The Sierra Club, an environmental organization that strongly supports wind energy, has publicly strongly opposed both the R-Project and wind energy development in the environmentally sensitive Nebraska Sandhills. NPPD chooses to ignore these environmental concerns.

NPPD has again touted their public meeting process for the R-Project. What they have failed to disclose is the strong and vocal public opposition to this project by the public as well as multiple State and Federal agencies and private organizations. NPPD chooses to ignore the public.

NPPD states that the SPP would have another entity build the project if they did not and that Nebraskans would rather it be built by NPPD. The misleading point here is that the SPP wants NPPD to build because they have eminent domain authority. This gives them almost unlimited condemnation authority leaving landowners with significant line related liability and minimal options. After 5 years of efforts at easement acquisition over 80 miles remain to be acquired and many of these will be acquired by condemnation. NPPD frequently states that the majority of easements are obtained voluntarily. This is an untruth.

The R-Project is now 5.5 million dollars over budget for the pre-construction phase and projected to be 50-100 million dollars over budget for its construction. NPPD and other Nebraska utilities already produce energy in excess of the needs of our state. NPPD is functioning as a minion of the SPP which does not focus on the best interests of Nebraska. Taxpayer dollars could be better spent. NPPD chooses to ignore this truth.

NPPD and their Board of Directors need to listen to and serve the public, but...NPPD chooses to ignore this truth!

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
