FORTY YEARS AGO

OCTOBER 12, 1978

McPherson County High School's Homecoming king and queen were Steve Miller and Patty Arensdorf.

Karen Lutes was the new welfare director at Tryon. She replaced Shirley Daigger who had been the local director for the past year.

Several improvements were made to the McPherson County Courthouse and included a new sidewalk and steps, new water well put down by Haney Well Drilling, and carpeting would be installed in the offices and hallway.

The Frontier Café in Tryon would close indefinitely effective October 31.

FIFTY YEARS AGO

OCTOBER 10, 1968

The Tryon United Methodist Church would serve a pit barbecue, bazaar, country store,

bake sale and blue rock shoot as they planned their 14th annual fall festival.

This part of the country received the first freeze of the season October 2 when the temperature dipped to 27 degrees. Last year we received the first freeze September 27.

Homecoming queen and king candidates were Donna Stoddard, Clara Munson, Vicki Miller, Sandra Nicholson, Renee Ellis, Jim Neal, Rocky Nicholson, Bob Stevenson, Jerry Kemp and Cecil Bullington.

Deaths: Raymond W. Gross, 61, died September 21.

Several area feed dealers and their farmer customers joined more than 450 of the nation's top hog farmers attending a

conference in Illinois. Attending from this area were feed dealer, Herschel Ansel, and Harold Neal and John Neal, both hog raisers in McPherson County.

SIXTY YEARS AGO

OCTOBER 9, 1958

In their first home game of the season, the Longhorns won over Maxwell, 12-7, with Herb O'Connor scoring the first touchdown and Doug Smolik running it in from 18 yards out.

Tryon Community Methodist Church would host their annual Lord's acre festival October 18. The school band would open the morning program and there would be contests and games for everybody.

The Graphic was advertising "Whirl a Hoops" (known as the hula hoop) for \$1.25. This was the large 36" size. Also there was a sale on Christmas and all occasion greeting cards.

There were 1,000 to 1,200 head of cattle consigned for the October 11 special calf and yearling sale at the Tryon Sale Barn.

A bridal shower would be held for Mrs. Karl Kemp in the high school auditorium.

SEVENTY YEARS AGO

OCTOBER 14, 1948

George Van Meter was elected chairman for the county at an organizational meeting of the Nebraska Friendship Train.

Hugh and Louvela Priest and daughter Audrey ventured to Denver and Orval Dornan took them on a 175-mile drive through Denver and the mountains. Mr. and Mrs. Gordon Bassett and Kenny stayed here and kept the home fires burning at the Graphic office.

The following story was taken from the Thursday, September 8, 1938 issue of *The Tryon Graphic*. It was the "Winning Entry in our Pioneer Picture Contest," in the anniversary edition celebrating the *Graphic* entering its 50th year of publication.

This picture of McPherson County's first courthouse taken in 1896 and showing some of the county officials and other people prominent in the community at that time was judged the most interesting picture entered in our pioneer picture contest. The picture was entered by Mrs. Geo. Dolph of North Platte, a former resident here, and one of the two ladies posing in the picture.

The picture was taken

the morning after the bi-annual oyster supper and dance, it being the custom in those days for the elected county officials to treat the entire county to an oyster supper and dance soon after the General Election. This picture was taken on the south side of the courthouse and judging from the hands in the pockets, it must have been a crisp day.

McPherson County's first courthouse was built in 1890, right after the county was organized. Like all other buildings in the county it was constructed principally of sod, but a good tight shingle roof was supplied and the building was built spacious enough that it was felt it would suffice

for office space for several years at least. The building was constructed by contract. Some contracting for laying the sod walls, others for building the roof. A separate contract for the building of the brick vault, which incidentally was a costly part of this pioneer capitol. Old commissioner meeting minutes reveal that the vault door was purchased from the State Journal Co. of Lincoln, which concern also got the first order for county printed supplies, record books, etc.

The old sod courthouse was divided into one large room, the courtroom, on the west, a store room, the vault and one large office
