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Eclipse 2017: A Four Day Tipi Encampment

A totally unique, once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to view a Total Solar Eclipse from a Tipi Camp in the Nebraska Sandhills and to share knowledge and history with others.

A cattle sorting event and working cow dog exhibition both educated and entertained our guests. The tipi encampment and flint knapping demonstrations were an enormous hit! An extra bonus was having the cowboys just a short distance away.

The craft and quilt shows were also an exten-

tion of our culture with beautiful quilts and crafts that included everything from grass bowls to pens made from antlers to photography, homemade jams and jellies, skull painting, barbwire designs, wood crafts, rope bowls and t-shirts and many others.

The how to build a soddy demonstration held at the soddy was another favorite as well as the antique tractor show from local contributors, comments were from "I remember that... to what is that?"

We are very proud of Alice Lutes and Geneva Connell for the job they did with the music program and of our local talent and our heritage they so very well depicted.

I feel we, as a committee, and the community were totally overwhelmed by the appreciation and the respect we were given by these visitors.
