SIXTY YEARS AGO
DECEMBER 11, 1958

Friendly Workers Club met at the Lillian Coty home and preparations were made for the Christmas party in the old Black Store building. Maude Wade drew the mystery present.

Edward Bullington and Theta Cole of California were married in Carmel, California.

The senior class had sold over \$450.00 in ads for their annual and had sold several subscriptions.

The David Store had brought in many new items for Christmas. Decorations included lights, tinsel, icicles, tree tops, and bells. Trees were selling for .79 to \$1.59 as long as they lasted.

SEVENTY YEARS AGO
DECEMBER 16, 1948

The double obituary of Mr. and Mrs. Mike David appeared in this issue. Mrs. David was killed instantly in a car accident as the couple traveled from

Tryon to Omaha to visit a daughter. Mr. David died 24 hours later, never regaining consciousness. Mr. David came to this country in 1886 and established a general store in Tryon in 1905. The Davids were highly respected and loved by everyone in the community.

All young men were reminded they are required to register with the draft board on their 18th birthday or within five days thereafter. The office was open Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday afternoons.

EIGHTY YEARS AGO
DECEMBER 15, 1938

Mr. and Mrs. Dan Connell were announcing the arrival of a baby daughter born last week at their home south of Tryon.

Plans were completed to change highway 16 across Nebraska to number 92; the changing making it to conform with a direct route across Illinois and Iowa and across Nebraska from Omaha to North Platte under that number.

A case of bold cattle theft was reported near Merriman. A yearling had been butchered within two hundred feet of the highway about 10 miles west of Merriman. Cattle stealing in the modern way was a serious problem to ranchers.

Nebraska's families will spend an average of \$62.93 each this year for Christmas as their share of the nation's forecast two-billion dollar total.

Coach Henry Railsback's high school basketball team lost an encounter with the O'Fallons team on the local court, 19-15.

The *Grant County Tribune* reported the election

Starrs Compete In Northeast Community College's Livestock Classic

Four hundred head of livestock were shown during the 34th Annual Northeast Community College Livestock Classic held over the Thanksgiving Day weekend.

Mike Roeber, Northeast agriculture/livestock judging instructor and event organizer, said exhibitors from five states (Colorado, Iowa, Kansas, Nebraska and South Dakota) took part in the two-day event at the Chuck M. Pohlman Agriculture Complex.

Roeber said that despite lower attendance than last year, the exhibitors still had a strong showing. "While the total numbers for the weekend

were down nearly 50 compared to a year ago, the quality of cattle was exceptional. I attribute the lower numbers to two things - a couple other shows in the region which have started up in the past few years and the weather forecast for snow and wind, especially to the south, which either kept some exhibitors away or had some who went home after Friday's show to get ahead of the weather."

The Supreme Champion Breeding Heifer was a Red Angus shown by Hadley Hartman, Tecumseh. The Reserve Supreme Breeding Heifer was a Maine Anjou shown

by Ashtyn Danker, Avoca, IA.

The Supreme Champion Market Animal was a Chianina shown by Cade Stratman, West Point. Ansley Maronde, York, showed the Reserve Champion Market Animal with a Crossbred.

A total of 214 head were exhibited in the Breeding Heifer Show, judge by Scott Schaaque, Westmoreland, KS.
