### Bootlegging...or not...closer to home

A recent issue of the 'Stapleton Enterprise' had a picture and an article about the raiding of a plant for the manufacture of alcoholic beverage in 1922 in Douglas County - note that location - (I guess the reason these 'cooking' contraptions were designated as 'stills' is that it was short for 'distillery' even if it was on a very small scale and arranged in a very simple and/or disorganized fashion, but they were called that on both sides of the law) during the early days of prohibition.

I think that word 'prohibition', and perhaps if you like to play with words you could here add other little "p" words like 'production for profit' or 'pursuit by police' (what day lately have you not heard the words 'packing pot' along the interstate corridor across Nebraska) applies to many things besides alcohol! The reason I suggested you 'bookmark' Douglas county is because that's Omaha and a lot of

corruption seems to collect wherever people collect (and as I write this story, on January 25th, I am in California where a lot of good, and bad, people have collected). Anyway this picture showed the proverbial 'everything but the kitchen sink', and even that might have been in the pile except I don't think, in 1922, most of this cooking was done in the kitchen!

I suppose some self righteous person might say, "yeah, down east by the big town," but let's get closer to home. The only reason I can use a name like 'Russell Goslin' is because the last two words I read in the old court files said, "found nothing"!

Russ lived out northwest of Arthur on Section 5-19-39, some of my readers probably know exactly where this is, which was a little before I got big enough to remember him (aren't you surprised that I remember anything).

Goslin, we sometimes

referred to him as 'Goose Goslin', was married to Julia Hurlbert whose folks homesteaded section 22 about four or five miles from the Goslin place and probably the only reason I knew him as well as I did was that Julia's sister, Esther, was married to Henry Reichenberg who was a close neighbor of my folks from around 1907. I went to school with their kids until they left Arthur county in either 1942 or 43. Another little insert, of interest to some, might be that I recently talked, on the 'ringy-dingy', to Robert Reichenberg (I once mentioned him as the pitcher on Arthur's baseball team in 1938-39) who seems to be doing pretty well even though he's getting old, yeah he was a senior when I was a 'lowly' freshman!

I came to a fork in the road there and in my confusion I don't know which
