McPherson Co Ag Students Compete in MPCC SkillsUSA

McPherson County Ag Education Students competed in the Skills USA contest that was held on January 30. The Mid Plains Community College Career and Technical department hosted the event. Students could compete in drafting, building construction, carpentry, electrical, HVAC, novice welding and competitive welding.

Competing in Competitive Welding were Kyon Neal, Caleb Goosey, and Jared Schultis. Each welder had to complete welds using SMAW (stick), GMAW (wire welding), and GTAW (tungsten inert gas) process during the contest. Kyon Neal placed second in this event.

Kyon Neal, Mason Ward, Jared Schultis and Caleb Goosey also competed in the HVAC (Heating Ventilation Air Conditioning) contest. Each member of the team completed a written test and lab practical. The lab practical included sweating and brazing copper tubing which was then pressure tested for leaks. Kyon Neal placed third, Mason Ward fourth, Jared Schultis 7th and Caleb Goosey 10th.

After the contest, MPCC provided the students and instructors with a meal. During the awards ceremonies the president of the college welcomed the students to their campus and handed out metals to the top three individuals in each contest.
