Early County History

Some stuff that I write, and most certainly some stuff that other people write, can't be pinpointed as to time or eventual happening. I have pretty good documentation for the building and certainly the existence of the first jail in Arthur county. It's right there for you to look at (and then you can believe, or not, the rest of what I write). I left out that little word "it" so Ripley couldn't accuse me of plagiarism!

We can only imagine some of the discussion that had taken place in the first two years of the existence of Arthur County, and the pro's and con's brought up by the first officers, and can only wonder about the security provided with/for anyone taken into custody, even if it was only to allow time for 'sobriety' to be restored. Did the first Sheriff simply handcuff his prisoner, or maybe just tie his arms around a tree with his handy-dandy lasso? In later years I heard Sheriff Fwank Hayes - Fwank didn't have any teeth- tell about taking into custody, and probably putting in that jail, one of the feisty, inebriated local young guys. This young citizen could no doubt have easily handled Fwank in an evenly matched scuffle but Fwank told me, "I hit him with my 'biwwy' and he was easier to handle".


Whatever method was used it was not satisfactory and on May 21, 1916 we read that the commissioners met with a representative of both a "jail building firm" and the salesman from "The E T Barnum Iron Works" for a "steel cage holding cell". No prices were quoted but

ing cage was placed in the basement of the courthouse as it was built and by the time I arrived in McPherson county in 1926 (that was the date on the capstone above the door when they finished) the building was nearing completion.

Getting confusing, isn't it? Time, perhaps more

certainly in Nebraska than in the old towns of Europe and Asia, is hard on buildings. Arthur replaced its 'smallest courthouse' and I outlived the one at Tryon. In their new (it's hard to define 'new' anymore in the throw-away world in which we live) no jail was planned. It's almost impossible to find someone who feels that he or she is being treated fairly. The accused, the suspect (and I agree with the concept that I should be considered innocent until proven 'guilty') demands better treatment than the officer protecting the public. But I believe that a metal 'cage' (probably not a \$1,500 one) should be good enough for a "Jail Bird"! I rather imagine, and haven't had the opportunity to check like I did on the above 'story' that the cages where we now take our "accused" are 'gilded cages' and the service and treatment are at least 'four star'! But like I said earlier, "It's only tax money" and nothing we are allowed to include in the enforcement of decency seems to be any 'deterrent' to crime! How about Fwank's 'Biwwy'?
