## Hereford Crossroads Reception Planned for October 2017

The third annual Hereford Crossroads Reception will be held at the Loup County Events Center in Taylor, on Saturday, October 21. The reception is open 3:00 to 9:00 p.m.; and supper will be served at 6:00 p.m.

This is a gathering for those who love the proud breed with the white face. The reception will feature prominent area Hereford breeders and organizations. Attendees will learn about the continued effort to establish a Nebraska Hereford Museum in the Nebraska Sandhills.

"This year's Hereford Crossroads celebration is one of only a very few events earning the designation of an official Nebraska sesquicentennial celebration," said Hereford Crossroads committee member Linda Teahon. "This is because it has a focus on agricultural history."

New members will be inducted into the Nebraska Hereford Hall of Fame at the reception. The current list includes Charlie Warner, Sam McKelvie, Wilbur Drybread and John Cooksley. Other tentative plans include a showing of the art of Bud Snidow and Tom Phillips, a lunch and tour at Bootleg Brewers, displays of Hereford breeder memorabilia, a cash bar and door prizes.

## Nebraska LEAD Announces 2017-19 Fellows

Nebraska LEAD (Leadership Education/Action Development) Group 37 participants have been announced by the program's director, Terry Hejny. The two-year program began in September.

The newest members of Nebraska's premier two-year agricultural leadership development program are involved in production agriculture and/or agribusiness in Nebraska.

Bree DeNaeyer of Seneca is among the Nebraska LEAD Fellows named.

"We are proud to say that Class 37 appears to be filled with outstanding individuals from throughout the state and I am excited to get started with them. Our job will be to prepare and motivate them for future leadership roles in their community, our state and beyond," Hejny said.

LEAD Fellows will participate in 12 monthly three-day seminars across Nebraska, a 10-day national study/travel seminar and a 14-16 day international study/travel seminar. The goal of the program is to develop problem solvers, decision makers and spokespersons for agriculture and Nebraska.

Seminar themes include leadership assessment and potential, natural resources and energy, leadership through communication, agricultural policy and finance, Nebraska's political process, global perspectives, nuclear energy, social and cultural issues, understanding and developing leadership skills, agribusiness and marketing, information technology, advances in health care, the resources and people of Ne-

braska's Panhandle and other areas designed to develop leaders through exposure to a broad array of current topics and issues and how they interrelate. The Nebraska LEAD Program is operated by the non-profit Nebraska Agricultural Leadership Council in cooperation with the Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln and 12 other institutions of higher education throughout Nebraska.
