Between the Lines

Most of you won't make a connection between the thoughts I have this week, but in 80 years you might be able to appreciate where I am coming from. Let me 'spin a yarn' in only generalities,

Derrick Fransen was born in McPherson County, north of Tryon, in a sod house, on January 7, 1924. That makes him pretty darned old, right? I'm near enough his age, only two years younger, that I want to mention some of the things I recently learned about his life and compare them with things in my own life to give you more things to wonder about.

There were five of the Fransen children and although they lived in the same area as we four did, we never interacted with them because of the travel methods, distances and relationships, but let me mention just a few of the similarities and coinciding experiences we shared even though we never really knew about them.

They lived for a while on the Trembley place north of where I now live and went to school at the Palmer place, land now all owned by Storer's, the

same school that was later moved east and where my wife taught and my kids attended.

Fransen later lived on the Hossick place and attended the Diamond Bar school where I taught in 1947 and 1948. Attending with them at this school were Gerald and Geneva Lancaster. Geneva and Maxine later married Neal brothers who still have descendants in our area. When they went to this school they rode horses when the weather was nice or drove a team hitched to a cart so all except a driver could stay covered up. The driver could be changed frequently. I wonder if some of the families sometimes shared rides? I know others that did this even without permission part of the time. My wife used to tell me stories of this in her education. I probably shouldn't go any farther afield with that story. Attending this school at that time were the Magnuson boys who lived at a hunting and fishing lodge at the east end of the big Diamond Bar lake. Oran lived in Arthur later and Buster ran a sports shop in Ogallala and sold my

son Brian his first rifle that is still in my closet. Humans are like other animals in seeking mates and one of Mrs. Fransen's brothers became a doctor who married Orilla Shaw who was raised in the Center Valley community with both my parents. Fransen left the local area. I'm glad that, like me, they still have enough sandy roots that they return. They moved to Washington state, via a stop in Idaho, in a homemade travel camper, in 1934. My grandmother and most of her family did this in the fall of 1929, leaving the original homestead of my granddad in my family for perpetuity (my word for this week).

While I was thinking of the rural schools that Derrick and I attended, and even the ones I taught, I was comparing, in my mind, other things of the two eras. How about the room we had in our schools and in our homes. Two different building projects have taken place in our area recently and I'm not going to comment on them because I would

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
