### Between the Lines

old was bound to a farmer in Morgan County, Illinois, remaining with said farmer until of age, and was to have two suits of clothes and \$100.00 for his labor, also sixteen months of schooling. He received the \$100.00, but only one suit of clothes and about twelve months of schooling scattered through the four years, going to school in bad weather and when there was no work to do on the farm.

This week I was 'working' (?) on an update of some genealogy and late on Saturday night was copying something from the paper from Leon, Iowa, about 180 years ago and I thought, yes I still think, "I can 'jump' from here." What isn't a direct quote will be in parentheses.

"F. M. Thompson (Francis Marion, my great grandpa) farmer and stock raiser resides on section 13; Long Creek Township, where he owns 307 acres of land.

He was born in McCoupin County, Illinois August 9, 1830, a son of Andrew and Sarah Woodring Thompson. His father came from Illinois to Iowa in 1854 where he remained for six years thence to Dakota for the same length of time, then to Decatur County, Iowa, where he still resides. F. M. Thompson when seventeen years

old was bound to a farmer in Morgan County, Illinois, remaining with said farmer until of age, and was to have two suits of clothes and \$100.00 for his labor, also sixteen months of schooling. He received the \$100.00, but only one suit of clothes and about twelve months of schooling scattered through the four years, going to school in bad weather and when there was no work to do on the farm.

I feel like this is a good place for me to comment on some things. I'm sure my great grandpa was eating his share at three meals a day and probably carried a lunch to school some days but doesn't being paid \$25 a year seem rather meager? At least he, apparently, actually was paid. And great grandpa probably had some clothes on when he went to work, and the 'lady of the house' probably got embarrassed enough, especially if she had a daughter, to either do some mending or loan Marion a needle and furnish him some thread.

And, oh yes, do I have any farmers or ranchers for readers? I think grandpa was pretty lucky to find that much time for school when, there was NO WORK to do on the farm. He was married in his native state, remaining there until 1859. Then he came to Decatur County, Iowa and settled near his present home. He rented land for two years, and then made a purchase of some land and began to enter vigorously upon the work of improving the same. When he came to Decatur County his objective point was Kansas, but running short of money he was compelled to stop here and make a crop. Yes my grandpa was forced to stop, but only God could 'make' a crop, and doing well he concluded to remain. (Part of this is a repeat) He was married in Marion County, Illinois to N. L. McDaniel, daughter of Eli and Mary McDaniel of Scotch-Irish ancestry. She was born in Sangamon County, Illinois in

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
