Local Working Group Meetings Planned

Local meetings open to individuals interested in setting natural resources goals for Nebraska.

A Local Working Group that provides advice on the priorities for many U.S. Department of Agriculture conservation programs will meet March 23rd at 10 a.m. at the Upper Loup NRD Building, 39252 Hwy 2, Thedford, NE.

The public is encouraged to attend and express their natural resource concerns. Ideas generated from the public will help the U.S. Department of Agriculture tailor their natural resource programs to meet the needs identified locally.

There is a Local Working Group in each Natural Resources District (NRD). Membership on the Local Working Group includes Federal, State, county, Tribal or local government representatives ac-

cording to Kevin Hood, district conservationist for the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) whose agency guides the Local Working Group.

"The Local Working Group recommends to the NRCS State Conservationist how conservation programs like the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP), Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP), or Agricultural Conservation Easement Program (ACEP) would be used most effectively in their area. This recommendation can include special target areas, cost share rates on conservation programs, which conservation practices should have cost assistance, or how many dollars could be

needed," said Hood. This work group allows local input into how Federal dollars are spent, he said.

Typically, Nebraska NRCS obligates anywhere between \$45 million to over \$75 million dollars to farmers and ranchers statewide through NRCS conservation programs. These programs helped landowners and operators make natural resource improvements to their land, water, or wildlife. This funding was allocated according to the priorities set by the Local Working Group.

It is with great sadness that after much discussion and evaluation the Pioneer Memorial rest home board of directors and leadership have decided to close the facility on April 25, 2022. This decision was made after great effort by our team members to overcome the challenges of operating a nursing facility in a small rural area.

Our immediate needs were more than just financial and a director of nursing. The increase in cost for adequate staffing and supplies, the difficulty in recruiting new team members, the lack

of Medicaid reimbursement, increased regulations, and the effects of the pandemic over the last two years have all contributed to the closure.

There have been several facility closures throughout Nebraska and several more that are considering closing soon due to the unprecedented effects over the last two years and the lack of reimbursement.

This was a difficult decision to make as we realize the effect it will have on our community. It has been an honor to serve our community throughout the years and we are so appreciative of the support you have shown the

facility.

We want to assure you that our residents will be given ample support and time to make decisions about relocation to a new residence. Team members will also be assisted in finding new employment as we are able. We are having a job fair at our facility Wednesday, March 9, from 9-11 a.m. Any employers with open positions are encouraged to attend. NPPD crews begin annual inspection of transmission lines

Residents around the state may soon see a helicopter or Nebraska Public Power District (NPPD) trucks and UTVs near powerlines as crews begin their annual spring inspection of the transmission system.

NPPD wants residents to be aware of this process, which involves looking at

every component on every transmission structure, across the state, over the next couple of months. "This allows us to identify any parts or equipment on the transmission system that might need replaced or repaired," notes NPPD Transmission Manager Bob Blessin. "By doing

that, we can avoid outages that would have otherwise occurred, reduce costs by being proactive with maintenance, and improve the overall reliability of the system throughout the year."
