

Johnston To Compete at U.S. Junior Championships

Coy Johnston can't remember a time he wasn't rodeoing. At four years old, the Stapleton native was goat tying and barrel racing. Now that he's 18, he's steer wrestling. And to say that he's pretty good at it is an understatement. Johnston is terrific at it and has the belt buckles to prove it.

The reigning National High School Finals Rodeo Steer Wrestling National Champion is headed to Marble Falls, Texas with the goal of adding the U.S. Junior Steer Wrestling Championship to his list of accomplishments in 2022.

The event is Sunday, Oct. 9, and will be televised on The Cowboy Channel at a later date.

Johnston, who is the Nebraska Steer Wrestling State Champion, is the latest in a family of rodeo champions. Grandfather Jim won the Bull Riding Championship in 1962 - 60 years to the day Coy won his national title. Jim and Judy had four sons - James "Chad," Jason, Jeff and Joel - and all four qualified for the National High School finals thanks

to ending the year in the top four. Chad won the team roping header title in 1987, while Jeff won the team roping heeler title in 1992.

Steer wrestling, however, is the Johnston family event. Jason won state titles in the event and the all-around in both 1990 and 1991 and Jeff won the state championship and the all-around in 1992. Joel won the all-around in 1995.

Jason was still competing on the rodeo circuit when he met another rodeo standout - Jennifer Kreikemeier. Once the two married, Jennifer became a registered nurse. Meanwhile, Jason got into the well service business and started his own company in 1999. Jason built an arena so their sons, Coy, Cayson and Cotter, could continue the rodeo legacy that began generations earlier.

"It's a family tradition I'm trying to carry on," Coy said. "Since all my uncles grew up doing it, it's easy to get help. Dad practices with me at night. I get a lot of help. A lot of people have done it and have had quite a bit of success."

But the addiction, he

adds, comes from the feeling he gets when he steer wrestles.

"I like the adrenaline rush," he said. "There's nothing like it."

One change from when his dad and uncles competed is that high school rodeo contestants can win prize money, including Coy. He said he's saving his money to buy a trailer and wants to earn a rodeo

scholarship to attend college.

"After college, I definitely want to make some runs at the National Finals Rodeo to see if I can make it," he said. "Maybe I'll be good enough."

He'll face others his age at the U.S. Junior Steer Wrestling Championship who've won state titles from Alabama, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Texas.

More than 20 junior steer wrestlers are competing for \$12,500 in prize money. Each contestant competes in a three-round qualifier. The top four money winners advance to a four-man match play tournament. The No. 1 money winner meets the No. 4 money winner in one semifinal, while the No. 2 and No. 3 money winners face off in

the other semifinal. The winners of the semifinals meet in the final to determine the champion.

The champion earns \$5,000 and the Reagan Walker Buckle created to honor the late Reagan Walker, who is one of the most decorated Texas high school rodeo athletes in history who died in an auto accident in 2011. The reserve champion wins \$2,500, and the contestant with the fastest time of the day in the qualifying rounds or matches receives a \$1,000 bonus.

Coy said this is his first year to compete at the U.S. Junior Steer Wrestling Championship.


"You definitely have to be consistent," he said. "You make one bad run, it'll take you out. You have to be at the top of your game and you definitely have to be consistent. I like going to different places and having different competition. I think it's fun. This event is going to be great. It has a good setup. I'm excited. In rodeo, you always have ups and downs. Overall, I think I'm sitting pretty good."
