Licking honored by state tourism industry

Terri Licking of Thedford was among those honored with a 2022 Nebraska Tourism Industry Award at the recent annual Celebrate Nebraska Awards Banquet held October 27 at Marriott Riverfront in South Sioux City.

Licking received the Friend of Tourism Award. Licking has been a long-time leader in the area and has promoted Thomas County's tourism, economic development and agriculture. She has served several times as president of the Sandhills Journey Scenic Byway and was instrumental in helping the route earn the National Scenic Byway designation in 2021. Licking was a charter member of the Nine Byways in Nebraska.

She is active in the Thomas County Historical Society, the Thedford Art Guild, and she has been a promoter and supporter of the Nebraska National Forest.

The Double T Bar in Halsey observed its 50th anniversary with friends and customers stopping in to congratulate Reta Teahon on achieving the milestone.

Reta said she is thankful for the many friends and family who attended and for the cards, flowers and gifts.


Halsey has changed over the past 50 years and has seen a decline in population as most small towns in the Sandhills. According to Nebraska Demographics the population in 2021 stands at 64 residents.

It was quite different when brothers Leland and Bill Teahon, along with Bill's wife Val, purchased the business and opened on election day, November 7, 1972 as the Double T Bar. Lee's wife Anne (Barnes) Teahon had passed away in September of that year.

The bar opened up at 8:00 p.m. since it was election day and could only remain open until midnight. In spite of the shortened hours a lot of alcohol was sold.

Bill and Val ran the Double T during the day and Lee continued to work at the Ryman Brothers Ranch north of Halsey. Lee would drive to town and work the evening shift.

Lee married Reta Hardy on October 5, 1973. She had grown up seven miles north of Thedford and attended Antelope Valley School before graduating from Thedford High School. Reta worked at the Cowpoke and had dreams of going to Grand Island School of Business.

"I came from a large family. I was the youngest of seven children and I knew it was going to be a struggle for my parents, Bert and Eva Hardy, so I took a job at the extension office in Thedford and worked at the Cowpoke. At that time we had 550 kids enrolled in 4-H in the Thedford District."

Reta quit the extension job in December of 1976 to help Lee at the Double T. Major renovations of the business were completed in 1977 and included the removal of a wall and repositioning the bar from the south side of the building to the north side.

Lee and Reta later pur-

chased Bill and Val's share of the business and continued to make improvements to the building, including the addition of a new kitchen and dining room.

The Double T became well-known for homemade meals and was known for prime rib on Saturday nights and special occasions.

Reta's chicken fried steaks are extremely popular and the business became a gathering place for local citizens and hosted special events.

The Double T building has been around a long time. It was built in the early 1900's by a Mr. Dodd. It stood on the

main street of Halsey and housed a hotel and cafe. D.A. and Etta Rodocker purchased the business in 1922 and moved their family from a ranch north of town. The Rodockers ran the hotel and it sat in a prime location next to the railroad tracks and a block south of the major highway.

Lester Harris purchased the hotel from the Rodockers and cut the bottom story of the building out and lowered the second story to the ground.

Everett Iverson purchased the one story building in 1948 and renovated it into a tavern. Other owners have been Bob Simonson, Earl Johnson, Vern and Joyce Dickman, and Fritz and Shirley Marten.

"Here's to 50 more," Reta said as she plans to continue on with the bar and restaurant she has worked in with her husband, Lee, for so many years. The business has

been their life and their home.

It has been hard since Lee's death on January 5, 2012, but she has had help from her three sons and she has been able to carry on. She is open seven days a week and still serves Sunday buffet with help from a friend, Marilyn Ladwig, 88, who drives up from Lexington. Marilyn waits tables and comes up on Thursday and goes home Tuesday mornings.

"The Double T's been good to me over the years and if I stayed home I'd miss seeing the people."

For now, Reta says she'll keep on working and serving the people of Halsey and the surrounding area.
