

Schaeffer honored for 24 years

Steve Schaeffer was thanked for his 24 years of dedicated service as a member of the Stapleton School District R-1 Board of Education. He will receive a windmill with an engraved plaque. His last board meeting was Monday, December 19.

Chance Connell will replace Schaeffer on the board and re-elected at the general election were Frank Kramer and Rich Burnside.

In other action at the regular meeting, the board voted to proceed with legal action regarding recourse concerning the school's HVAC system.

The board conducted an evaluation of the superintendent at a special meeting held December 19 at 8:00 a.m. and members voted to extend the contract for Superintendent Redinger for the 2023-24 school year.

Other topics of discussion and action:

- The community liaison's report by Bryan Regier included the November Chamber of Commerce meeting, the annual Christmas concerts drew a large crowd, upcoming honor band and choir performances and the upcoming spelling bee.

- Mr. Halstead was congratulated on a good book fair which generated approximately \$680.00 for books in the library.

- Possible lease of classroom space for daycare purposes.

- Approved purchase of a used golf cart with box not to exceed \$10,000.00 and to purchase a new floor scrubber.

Minimum wage increase goes into effect Jan. 1

Nebraska's minimum wage will increase from \$9.00 to \$10.50 on January 1, 2023 as the first step under Initiative 433 passed by voters in November goes into effect.

Fifty nine percent of Nebraska voters approved Initiative 433 that will gradually raise the state minimum wage to \$15.00 by 2026.

Initiative Measure 433 comes with the following increases to the minimum wage going forward:

- \$10.50 per hour effective January 1, 2023.

- \$12.00 per hour effective January 1, 2024.

- \$13.50 per hour effective January 1, 2025.

- \$15.00 per hour effective January 1, 2026.

The consumer price index will determine fu-

ture raises.

While some small business owners and workers are applauding the minimum wage hike others are saying there will be dire consequences.

Art Diamond, a professor of economics at the University of Nebraska at Omaha said raising the minimum wage has good intentions, but unforeseen consequences.

"There's going to be some unemployment," Diamond said. "And the people who tend to be laid off are people that might be described as 'marginal.'"

In 2021, the Congressional Budget Office projected that as many as 1.4 million Americans could face unemployment in the first year if the minimum wage increase is something that

increased to \$15.00 an hour all at one time. A gradual increase, like the one passed in Nebraska, saw that number shrink to 700,000. Diamond said 700,000 only accounts for the first year and it's likely unemployment trends would continue for years after that.

In 2016, when Nebraska's minimum wage was raised to \$9.00, the state's unemployment rate never rose above 3 percent. The gradual increase from \$9.00 an hour to \$15.00 an hour will help relieve stress put on business but won't alleviate it entirely, Diamond said.

State Sen. Terrell McKinney, one of the co-sponsors of the initiative, said the minimum wage increase is something that

can benefit Nebraskans in his North Omaha district and across the state. Other co-sponsors of Initiative 433 were Zeke Rouse and Nancy Williams. Williams is the CEO of No More Empty Pots, a Nebraska-based non-profit that focuses on helping families that are food insecure.

"One in five workers who will benefit is a parent supporting children and trying to make ends meet," Williams said. "The reality is that the cost of groceries, housing, and basics have gone up for years, and the minimum wage hasn't kept up."

"Parents just can't afford to pay rent, travel to work, put food on the table at today's minimum wage," Kate Wolfe, coordinator

for Raise the Wage Nebraska, said.

Wolfe believes more money in the hands of the community means more

money spent in local stores and businesses, which helps strengthen the local economy.
