

FINAL EDITION. That's the front page headline of the August 17, 2023 edition of the Norfolk Daily News. The headline was used to attract reader attention. It was NOT the final edition of the newspaper, but all across our country our freedom as citizens is at risk.

Freedom of the press is enshrined in the First Amendment of the Bill of Rights, but it will be greatly diminished if there is no local, community newspaper for citizens to rely upon, said Kent Warneke in the front page article.

Since 2005, more than 25% of U.S. newspapers have ceased publication. That has contributed to an estimated 70 million Americans living in what is known as a "news desert," where there is no or just one local news source in a community or county.

The American Journalism Project recently spoke with about 5,000 Americans located across the U.S. about their journalism preferences, and several themes emerged:

- People want more local news, with the emphasis on local.
- People want a shared, trusted source of facts.
- People want the full story of their communities to be told.
- People want to know about decisions before they're made, and they want decision-makers to be accountable for outcomes.
- People want to see themselves in the news.

Those five tenets are what the Daily News strives to provide, but here at our local newspaper office just like at the Norfolk newspaper, it's proving more challenging in a changing world and the proliferation of social media.

The first SORC was held in Arnold in August 2001. Thirty-four drivers came from 17 states to participate in the first event of its kind ever held in Nebraska. The event now sells out its grid of 120 each year on the first day of registration. Entry fees and sponsorship revenue is donated to improve the community and provide scholarships. In 2017, SORC donations exceeded \$1 million to such projects.
