## Invite young Nebraskans to build community with us

The 2023 Greater Nebraska Youth Survey makes me incredibly hopeful for the future of our state. Along with our partners at the Center for Public Affairs Research at the University of Nebraska at Omaha, we have surveyed over 3,700 middle and high school students in the past four years to better understand their priorities, values and desires and how

they truly feel about the places they call home.

The middle and high school students surveyed in 2023 (from schools in Arcadia, Crofton, David City, Diller-Odell, Imperial, Ogallala, Ord, Paxton, Pender, Shickley and Stuart) echoed many of the findings from previous surveys, such as the majority (58%) reporting they are extremely or somewhat likely to live in the area they live in now. Seventy-two percent do not recognize a negative stigma with remaining in

or returning to your hometown - something that has undoubtedly shifted in the past decade. These students don't know the future, but they have faith in Nebraska being a place they want to call home as they embark on their careers and begin their adult lives.

Natural resources stakeholders and subject matter experts were in Kearney for the annual Nebraska Natural Resources Districts (NRDs) Conference at the Younes Center Sept. 25-26, 2023.

The conference brought together NRD employees, directors and others integrally involved in conservation, technology and policymaking.
