Second round of emergency assistance for past-due rent & utilities is available

Applications are now open for the Nebraska Emergency Rental Assistance program, which provides up to \$30,000 of assistance per eligible household for past-due rent and utility payments

The Nebraska Emergency Rental Assistance program began accepting applications Thursday to provide a second round of financial assistance for rental and utility payments to income-qualified Nebraskans who experienced a financial hardship during the pandemic.

Qualified households may receive up to \$30,000 for past-due and future rent payments and past-due utility and internet payments. No more than \$4,000 of assistance can be applied toward past-due utilities. Past-due internet payments will be capped at \$100 per month. Funds will also be

utilized for housing stability services. A household may not receive more than 18 months of total combined assistance, including any assistance received under the first Emergency Rental Assistance program.

Funds will be distributed until they run out, or until September 2025, and they do not need to be paid back. Payments will be made directly to landlords and utility companies.

The \$48 million program is funded by the U.S. Treasury Department's second Emergency Rental Assistance program that was authorized by the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021. The program is being managed by the Nebraska Investment Finance Authority (NIFA).

To qualify for assistance, applicants must demonstrate a financial hardship during the COVID-19 pandemic; must have an income at or below 80% of area median income; must rent their primary home in Nebraska; and must be a legal resident. Residents of Douglas and Lancaster counties are not eligible. Douglas and Lancaster
