

Military Heirloom Going Home

Janelle Blake of Tryon was looking for a desk and she found just the one she was looking for at a storage unit auction in North Platte.

Just like an episode of Storage Wars, you never know what you'll discover when you purchase a unit. Some people find valuable antiques. Then there are those who find unique items, books and collectibles.

Blake said along with the desk, she uncovered a beautifully framed heirloom with pictures of Staff Sergeant Michael Infurna, and his fellow Air Force buddies.

There were two letters and a Western Union telegram to his father, Edward Infurna documenting the plight of his son and later the news that Staff Sergeant Infurna was indeed safe and would be returning home.

Blake knew she had to track down someone who would want the framed picture returned to the family. She learned that Sergeant Infurna had two children with his wife,

Helen. Grandson, Todd Infurna will be taking possession of the military picture.

One of the letters in the frame is dated July 29, 1944, and written to Mr. Edward Infurna from the Fifteenth Air Force Office of the Commanding General and signed by N.F. Twining, Major General, USA Commanding.

"As you are no doubt aware, much of the recent success of the Allied Armies in Europe has been due to the systematic destruction of Nazi factories and communications by the brave men of our Air Forces. On June 13, 1944, your son, Staff Sergeant Michael Infurna, 12174316, was to have taken part in a raid on targets in Germany, but his ship turned back before reaching its objective for reasons which are unknown.

"When last seen, Mike's Flying Fortress was apparently under good control but, since it has not been heard from again, we are forced to conclude that it was forced down in enemy territory. In the absence of any more definite information I can only ask you to cling to

your hope for your son's safety. If further word is received you will be notified as quickly as possible.

"Mike was well aware of the hazards involved in his job as a gunner on a B-17, but he wanted to serve his country in the capacity where he felt he could do most to advance the day of victory. He never hesitated to risk his life in the performance of his duties and has been awarded the Air Medal for his part in many dangerous missions. His friends here wish you to know that they are also concerned for his fate, and feel the deepest sympathy for you and his family at this trying time."

In a letter from the War Department dated June 19, 1944 from J.A. Ulio, Major General, The Adjutant General stated a report had been received that Staff Sergeant Michael Infurna was safe and interned in Switzerland.

"It is hoped that you will find comfort in the realization that the internee is not in unfriendly hands, and that he enjoys many advan-

tages not available to those held in enemy territory as prisoners of war."

A Western Union telegram dated March 6,

1945 reported that Staff Sergeant Michael Infurna was being returned to the United States to arrive in the near future. He would

be given an opportunity to communicate with his

2023 Christmas Blizzard

Troopers with the Nebraska State Patrol responded to nearly 150 weather-related incidents on Nebraska roadways on Christmas Day 2023. Troopers responded to 28 crashes and performed 117 motorist assists as much of the state experienced a white Christmas. The vast majority of incidents did not involve injuries. One crash occurring at approximately 11:30 a.m. Monday, December 25, resulted in the closure of east-bound Interstate 80 for approximately three hours. Winter driving conditions existed across the state on Tuesday and Blizzard Warnings remained in effect throughout much of north-central and western Nebraska. Travelers are encouraged to check 511 Nebraska.gov for updated road conditions. Stranded motorists should stay with their vehicle and call NPS Highway Helpline at *55.
