

## Your Local Newspapers Bring Home Awards

Two full days of learning, connecting and discussion made up the 2024 Nebraska Press Association convention held April 26 and 27 at the Cornhusker Marriott Hotel in Lincoln. Newspaper people from across the state gathered for the 151st time to participate in sessions, honor journalists, and recognize winners in the Better Newspaper Contest. This year's contest drew 2,569 entries and was judged by the South Carolina Press Association.

NPAS president Marcia Hora, owner and publisher of The Stapleton Enterprise, McPherson County News and Thomas County Herald, passed the gavel to newly elected president Dee Klein of North Platte. Klein, who joined The Telegraph in 1990, is Lee Enterprises' regional business development director for western Nebraska.

Hora addressed her colleagues and said it had been an honor and privilege to serve as NPAS/One Press president.

"I enjoyed establishing relationships with newspaper people across the state and to represent you in Washington, D.C. at the National Newspaper Association convention. Newspapers remain strong because of the dedication and commitment each one of you have and the role you play in communities across the state. 
The celebration starts with a coloring contest open to area students, with categories for ages 3-6, 7-11, and 12-15. Students can print coloring pages from the 80th celebration's website, or pick them up at local NNFG office and visitor center locations. The coloring pages must be turned in by July 31st, either to a local NNFG US Forest Service office location, mailed via US Postal Service: Smokey Bear Coloring Contest c/o Supervisor's Office, 125 N. Main Street, Chadron, NE 69337 - or emailed to SM.FS.nnf\_info@usda.gov There will be a winner selected from each category and they will receive a

tree from NNFG's own Bessey Nursery, in Halsey, NE.

## Plenty of improvements await state park visitors

Plenty of improvements in Nebraska's north-central state parks await visitors this year. Projects completed in 2023 or to be finished in 2024 will appeal to an array of park users. The following is a roundup of those improvements and projects:

### Sherman Reservoir State Recreation Area

The demand for modern camping facilities in central Nebraska is high. At Sherman Reservoir

State Recreation Area, West Ridge Campground has been expanded in a \$1.1 million project. The campground now has 61 campsites with Electric Plus (50/50 amp) service. A shower house roof also was replaced.

### Smith Falls State Park

Visitors again are enjoying the sight of Smith Falls, Nebraska's tallest waterfall. The waterfall at Smith Falls State Park, and the newly con-

structed 500-foot boardwalk to it, reopened in 2023, replacing the wooden boardwalk.

The \$2.7 million project includes a boardwalk built of composite decking on a steel frame with aluminum handrails and is compliant with the Americans with Disabilities Act. New benches provide places for visitors to rest and a platform over the stream has been added midway up the walkway.

### Calamus State Recreation Area

A new activity is available for visitors of popular Calamus State Recreation Area as an archery range has been built at a cost of just more than \$6,000.

### Long Pine State Recreation Area

Two Americans with Disabilities Act-compliant vault toilets are expected to be replaced this year at Long Pine State Recreation Area.

### Keller Park State Recreation Area

Campers at Keller Park State Recreation Area will find RV campsites that received an electrical upgrade at a cost of more than \$500,000. Two ADA-compliant vault toilets are expected to be replaced this year.

Merritt Reservoir State Recreation Area  
Good news for campers

at Merritt Reservoir State Recreation Area, the West Beeds campground will expand by 14 Electric Plus sites and a new shower house in a \$900,000 project to be completed this year.

### Victoria Springs State Recreation Area

A roof was replaced at Victoria Springs State Recreation Area for more

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
